Key Issues / Themes / Messages	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Much of the meeting was taken up with a review of a draft of the CCG's vision for delivering better frailty and end-of-life outcomes through the proactive care model: "Draft frailty EOL vision paper 2018 v5.pdf". 2. There are 13 Integrated Neighbourhood Teams in Leeds, but 18 Local Care Partnerships are expected under the Leeds Health & Care Plan. The boundaries of the LCPs will most likely not coincide with those of the Neighbourhood Teams, and in all probability not with the Neighbourhood Network Schemes either. 3. The CCG's aim is to roll out the proactive care model to four LCPs by April 2019. If my experience of the still nascent Seacroft/Cross Gates LCP(s) is typical, this seems optimistic.
Key Actions of Third Sector Representative	As far as possible, support and participate in the establishment of LCPs as an essential feature of the Leeds Health & Care Plan and the proactive care model.
Areas where additional support is required	It was acknowledged at the meeting that the CCG strategy document currently has inadequate provision for mental health. To try to improve my own knowledge, I will attend the Forum Central Mental Health Information and Strategy Session on 11th December 2018.
Anything else?	In an update on SWIFt (Time to Shine's Supporting Wellbeing strand), Helen Laird (Interim Head of LCC Public Health for Older People) introduced the Control Match Cohort Evaluation, which apparently has added a control group to the SWIFt data. Fuller details are awaited with interest.
