<p>Key Issues / Themes / Messages</p>	<p>LCC Employment and Skills: overview of the LCC Employment a Skills offer focused on;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Improving employment outcomes for people wanting to work • Supporting people taking steps to return to work <p>Primarily the service focuses on working age people however the service also offers support for older people contemplating a career change or at the transition pre/post retirement. The service will work collaboratively with partners to address the diverse needs of individuals and communities in particular the priority neighbourhoods (links being established with LCPs and Social Prescribing service). They also offer capacity building for staff and provide a signposting service.</p> <p>Population Health Management – update: overview of the current stage of the PHM programme provided in particular the focus on Frailty and the emerging links to the Transformation Fund monies that will be coming on stream in the near future; the first project to be developed is the Virtual Frailty Ward which will be overseen by LCHT and is currently being scoped out, with a view to the Ward being operational in the autumn.</p> <p>LCP/Primary Care Network- update: LCP development is progressing; a central project team has been established to support progress and a ‘maturity model’ has been developed to assess their progress and consistently applied criteria. From a governance perspective the Provider Partnership Board will have a role in providing oversight of LCP development. The alignment between the LCPs and the Primary Care Networks (PCN) was also presented; the PCNs will be covering populations of up to 50k and will formalize local collaboration as well as developing more integrated/multi-disciplinary approaches and the recruit of significant additional staff (primarily pharmacy). Whilst the</p>

	PCNs and LCPs are not absolutely aligned it is anticipated that there will be progress towards co-terminosity.
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
